graciously holding her lead. If the second boat to finish Nut third, but she loses to Patricia, who was only 30 seconds behind her and to whom she allows over two minutes. I do not wish to detract from Nutmeg's good work, but it must be remembered she races at her old rating, and at that barely holds her own, while the rest of her class have had their wings clipped.

Rogue Wins Again.

In the "R" boat race Rogue again won. Her performance is a record. First for the Freeman Cup, then first in each of the three days' racing here, winning the championship of her class. To-day she was wearing a new set of Ratsy sails, which suited her to perfection, and during these races her professional paid hand was on board, and he is evidently a real sailorman, and acted as guide to Mr. Parley, her owner and skipper. Kathea was only able to get a poor second, being nearly three minutes astern. Nayada was well up most of the way. She got the best of the start, was in the lead all the way down the wind on the first leg of the triangle, but lost out to Rogue, Kathea and M.E.S. in the work to windward.

Scraper was first in the 20-foot class. Dr Taylor and his daughter had to be content to drop back though, as the time shows, on account of time allowance.

Stranger's Hard Luck.

In the "P" class Stranger had a bad run of luck. Ever since she has had her sail plan reduced she has not been up to form, and of course in the light weather of the last four days her troubles have been many.

To my mind, the chief asset of the regatta was not the number of new boats. On the contrary, it was the number of old ones. A look over the list of veteran yawls, sloops and so on, and one realizes that to get fairly consistent racing the entries had to be divided into eight different classes and a most elaborate system of time allowances worked out so as to encourage future entries. It must strike one as a good thing that boats years old, both as to build and rig, raced against the "latest thing" and won a fair share of the prizes, and that sixty boats of all types from Montreal to Buffalo gathered together for the event. Another thing, more than thirty motor and steam yachts were in attendance each day, and that thousands of people lined the banks of Massassaga Point to watch proceedings.
