# 5 More Yachts Finish As Banquet Celebrates 1951 Rochester Race

The fourth annual Rochester Race, already down in the records as one of the roughest yachting affairs in Great Lakes history, sailed into history last night in a closing banquet that packed the starlight roof of the Sheraton Hotel.

Five of the 16 yachts that started the 377-mile world's longest fresh water race at 3 p. m. last Sunday, finally finished the race yesterday after anchoring for hours in the lee of Stony Island near the St. Lawrence while gales whipped the lake. Six had finished earlier.

F. Ritter Shumway, commodore or the host Rochester Yacht Club, presided over the dinner, flanked by W. S. (Bill) Calkins, chairman of the Rochester Race Committee.

The massive silver Rochester Race bowl for the winner was accepted by Clark Swart on behalf of the crew of the Escapade, the great Detroit yawl that won on both elapsed and corrected times and thus wrote Great Lakes yachting history by making a seasonal grand slam of all four distance races on the lakes.

## 2 Other Bowls Given

Two other bowls, the new twin William P. Barrows Memorial Trophies, went to Escapade as first to finish in Division 1 for the heavier boats, and Wilfred (Toot) Gmeiner of Grosse Pt., Mich., skipper of the 45-foot sloop Apache, first over the line in Division 2.

The Peck Farley Memorial Trophy or first Rochester boat to finish the race went to George Ford, owner-skipper of the yawl Venture 3rd, which dogged the leaders' heels throughout and finished third in corrected time.

Swart, in accepting the major bowl, read a telegram from Escapade's owner, Wendel Anderson, who although unable to be here for the race had followed it through twice-daily reports to his Wyoming ranch. The wire summed up the sentiments of most of the skippers. . . . "most gracious yacht club ever . . . and the most ungracious lake."

## He's First Commodore

Arthur M. R. Hughes, Rochester banker and skipper of the 40-foot cutter Lady Linden, one of the smaller craft forced to temporary anchorage in the worst of the blow, was introduced in one of the punch lines of the evening as First Commodore of the newly-formed Behind Stony Point Yacht Club.
