In the last few days Arden Poulsen of the RYC has had word that his offer was accepted for Yvonne, built in 1945 in Denmark; Bill Statt, the Star sailor, has bought Number DN179 in Oslo, Norway; Charles (Bud) Strobel of Genesee YC has tied down Tabu, built in '46, to replace his Comet, and Clarence (Barney) Wilson, the Genesee YC Lightning skipper, has just received word from Denmark that he has himself a Dragon.

The five boats are expected to arrive in Rochester and be unloaded at the respective clubs early in May.
