1st European Ship Since '40 Docks Here, Brings Yachts

The Ravnefjell, a 2,650-ton Norwegian freighter, the first European freighter to dock at Municipal Dock since World War II, this morning unloaded four racing yachts of the dragon class. Capt. Eugen Anmark of Oslo, Norway, said he brought the yachts from Copenhagen, Denmark, for Bernard R. Wahl of 1029 Fernwood Ave.; Arden E. Poulsen of 459 Beach Ave.;

Charles E. Strobel of 35 Varinna Dr., Brighton, and Clarence R. Wilson of 111 Estall Rd., Greece. Anmark, who heads a crew of 25, including Miss Eva Sandtroen of Tromso, Norway, wireless operator, left Denmark on April 10. The freighter called at London and then left for Montreal, making the crossing in 17 days. It left here for Toronto, Cleveland, Detroit, Milwaukee and

Chicago. It picked up no loads here. Joseph A. Biel, terminal manager, said the last European freighter, Ornefjell, also a Norwegian boat, docked here in secrecy in 1940. It loaded up with lubricating oil at the time. The racing yacht papers were cleared through U.S. customs at the dock. The yachts then were transferred to the Rochester and Genesee Yacht clubs.
