

Ahoy! Royal Canadian Picks Challenger

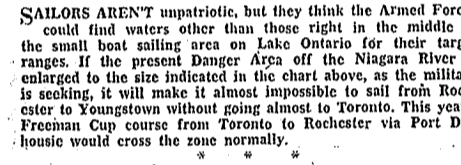
It will be Bill Gooderham and Buzzy II, the former Trixson of the last Olympics, that the Royal Canadian Yacht Club of Toronto will send to Rochester next week for the international George Cup 6-meter races. And the Canadians, from all accounts, are pretty sure they're going to recapture the famous trophy.

"Canada must be considered a better than even money bet to regain the George Cup . . ." writes George MacFarlane in The Globe and Mail. He backs up his statement by noting that Gooderham and Company piloted Buzzy II to eight wins in 11 races against such RCYC competitors as Reg Dixon's Circe. Circe was the boat that took the cup home two years ago after beating Jerry Castle's Stork and then lost it to Stork on a foul last year. And Stork may be Rochester Yacht Club's defender again this time.

Circe, which ended up in second place in the RCYC eliminations, has been put up for sale by Dixon, who apparently has called it a day in the Sixes.

This year will mark the first time since the war that more than one Canadian boat will be racing. Buzzy I, whose name has been changed back to its original Solonia, will represent the National Yacht Club at Toronto, with Babe Bavington as skipper, and Bob Morrison is expected to be here with Gallant from the Royal Hamilton YC. Either Fred Obersheimer or Skip Doyle of Youngstown will also make it a five-boat series.

First race will be sailed Wednesday, July 1, with the other two following on Thursday and Friday off the Genesee River piers.



SAILORS AREN'T unpatriotic, but they think the Armed Forces could find waters other than those right in the middle of the small boat sailing area on Lake Ontario for their target ranges. If the present Danger Area off the Niagara River is enlarged to the size indicated in the chart above, as the military is seeking, it will make it almost impossible to sail from Rochester to Youngstown without going almost to Toronto. This year's Freeman Cup course from Toronto to Rochester via Port Dalhousie would cross the zone normally.

ROCHESTER POWER SQUADRON sent a navigation crew to the 6th District Power Squadron rendezvous in Buffalo last weekend and came in second in the competition for the Streudel Trophy, beating five other teams. Winner was the Ithaca Power Squadron, holders of the Rochester and the Van Valkenburgh trophies.

Rochester's team was composed of Al Hartsig, Eino Jacken, and Alan Zolstrom. The visiting crews used Buffalo Squadron power cruisers, the RPS being assigned the 35-foot Richardson Boat IV of Larry Holcomb. Before they started the competition they had to run speed curves and deviation tables. Then they set out on the problem, which consisted of five courses lasting 1 1/2 hours.

Louise Suggs Captures Western Open, 6 and 5

Atlanta—(UP)—Louise Suggs shot men's par golf yesterday to defeat Patty Berg, 6 and 5, and win her fourth Women's Western Open golf championship.

Holding a 1-up lead as the afternoon round began, the little Atlanta pro began to place near-perfect shots that the chunky Miss Berg could not match. Miss Berg had trouble with her approach shots and putts.

Playing over her familiar home Capital City Club course, Suggs racked up a 5-up lead at the end of 27 holes. She took a 6-up lead on the 28th with a birdie 4 and halved the 29th with a par 3. She lost the 30th when Miss Berg chipped to within one foot of the hole for a birdie 4.

Closes Out match Miss Suggs sank an eight-foot putt on the 31st hole for a birdie three that closed out the match. The \$1,000 top money was added to Miss Sugg's record-breaking \$15,766 already won this year. Miss Berg took second place money of \$500 to add to the \$10,370 she has won.
