# A Cup Year

of interest to the Great Lake Yachtsmen.
While the gallant old Columbia, the speedy but unfortunate Constitution, and the untried Reliance, are battling for the honor of defending the supremacy of American yachtsmen on salt water, we of the inland sea will be watching with eager interest the performance of the craft which bears our hope of success. The history of the Canada cup is not so long as that of the American cup, but the contest has been less one-sided, and it is with strong hope of success that we look forward to the battle with our friendly enemies of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club.

The cup was originally offered by the city of Toledo in 1896, and was raced for off that city by the Vencedor of Chicago and the Canada of Toronto, the latter winning the contest and the cup. The cup was then presented by the owner of the Canada by deed of gift to the Royal Canadian Yacht Club as a perpetual international challenge trophy between representatives of the Yacht Clubs of the two nations bordering on the Great Lakes.

The Chicago Yacht Club was the first challenger, and no less than five yachts from that city were built for the trials. But there came also to the trials a vessel of broad beam and shallow draft, which took kindly to the waters of Lake Michigan—the Genesee. Her victory was an easy one, and later in the season, as the representative of the Chicago Yacht Club, she defeated the defender, Beaver, in a series of close and exciting races.

But the cup was not to remain long away from old Ontario's shores. In 1901 the Royal Canadian Yacht Club again competed for it, shrewdly building a boat to meet the light weather conditions of August on Lake Michigan. Cadillac, of Detroit, defeated the Chicago candidates for cup defense, but was unable to foot with Invader, the Toronto craft, which sailed like a witch in the light airs prevailing in three out of the four races.

The battle for the cup is this year directly between the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, defenders, and the Rochester Yacht Club, challengers. It promises to be a royal fight and when the starting oun is fired on August 8th, there will cross the line two boats representing the highest types of wholesome yacht building in the two great nations. Irondequoit, for such is the name of our challenger, designed by Gardiner, and built, without regard to expense, by Wood, of City Island, will prove a formidable antagonist for her Canadian rival. Mr. Gardiner ranks among the most successful designers of racing craft of about this size, his creations having frequently shown their taffrails to the best productions of Herreshoff, Smith, Crowninshield and Hanley. But the Canadians are by no means asleep. "Payne of Southampton" is the name which appears on the design of their new defender, and it is a name to command respect from any aspirant for cup honors.

Almost identical in size and rig, each craft, having a water line length of approximately 40 feet, a

beam of 13 feet, and an over all length of more than 60 feet, and spreading 2,600 feet of canvas to the breeze, the contest should be one in which the skill of the skipper will be no unimportant factor. There will be no time allowance and there should be some heart-breaking finishes before the next abiding place of the Canada Cup is decided. The Rochester Yacht Club fleet that anchors in Toronto bay the week of the races should be a large one. The Club owes to the syndicate which has gone to so great an expense in building the new boat, something more than a vote of thanks. It owes a hearty support of boat and crew; it owes a display of enthusiasm and interest that will encourage every amateur sailorman aboard the Irondequoit to do his level best toward bringing to our club rooms the coveted cup which we once won, but never held.

All else has not been lost sight of in this, the Cup year. There will be the usual weekly races for our local Corinthians and the usual social entertainments at the club house. The house verandas will prove more popular than ever. The dining room is now on the third floor, thus clearing the second balcony and making navigation much pleasanter for the rocking chair fleet, at the same time insuring better service for the diners.

With the increased membership, improved accommodations, and our growing fleet, much should be accomplished in the near future for the good of yachting on our inland sea.

DECORATION DAY, MAY 30TH OPENING CRUSING RACE TO SODUS BAY

THE preparatory gun will be fired from the East Pier at 8:50 A. M., and at 9:00 A. M. another gun will be fired for a signal to start. The start will be across an imaginary line drawn from the outer end of the East Pier to the outer end of the West Pier.

The classes will be started as follows:

9:00 A. M.—20-Foot Special Class 9:30 A. M.—20-25 Class 10:00 A. M.—30-35 Class

# Racing Rules

ENTRIES for the season shall be filed with Secretary of the Regatta Committee at least 24 hours before the first race. No time allowance shall be allowed any yacht whose owner has not, previous to the race in which the time allowance is demanded, filed with the Secretary of the Regatta Committee a certificate of measurement from the official measurer of the club.

All starts shall be "flying," and shall be one-gun starts. Five minutes before the time of starting, a preparatory gun will be fired. A red flag will be hoisted if all bouys are to be left to port, and a blue flag if they are to be left to starboard. Should the gun miss fire, the lowering of the flag shall be the signal to start.

The preparatory gun for all races, except those of May 30th, July 4th, and September 7th, will be fired at 2:20 P. M. Starts in the various classes will be as follows:

30–35-Foot Class ... 2:25 P. M. 20–25-Foot Class ... 2:30 P. M. Special 20-Foot Class ... 2:35 P. M. 16-Foot Class ... 2:40 P. M.

In the event of an unfilled class, the gun will not be omitted.

The time limit on all club races, excepting cruises, shall be 3 hours.

A yacht having no competition may sail over the course and claim half the points (500), but no trophy.

There will be no first prize in any series unless two yachts start, no second unless three, no third unless four.

All yachts larger than the Special 20-Foot Class shall be subject to the racing and measurement rules of the L.Y.R.A.

No boats shall be entered in the Special 20-Foot Class except such as are "yachts" under the ruling of the L. Y. R. A., but their racing length shall be computed as follows:


The 16-Foot Class shall be unrestricted as to form, construction, size or ballast, except that their racing measurement

under the "load water line and sail area" rule given on preceding page shall not exceed 16 feet.

Every yacht must go fairly around the course and must not touch any mark, but shall not be disqualified if wrongfully compelled to do so by another yacht.

Protests against a yacht for a violation of these rules must be filed in writing with the Regatta Committee within twelve hours after the finish of the race.

# Rightof Way

WHEN one yacht is approaching another so as to involve a risk of fouling, one of them shall keep clear of the other as follows:

On different Points of Sailing.
 A yacht free shall keep clear of one close hauled.

2. On the same Point of Sailing with the Wind on opposite sides.

When both yachts are close hauled, or both free, or both have the wind aft and on opposite sides, the yacht with the wind on the port side shall keep clear.

On the same Point of Sailing with the Wind on same side.
 When both yachts are free, or have the wind aft and on the same side, the yacht to windward shall keep clear.

#### 4. Wind Aft.

A yacht with the wind aft is deemed to have the wind on the side opposite to that on which she is carrying her main boom. A yacht with the wind aft shall keep clear of a yacht on any other point of sailing.

#### 5. Overtaking.

An overtaking yacht shall in every case, as long as an overlap exists, keep clear of the yacht which is being overtaken.

#### 6. Definition of Overlap.

An overlap is established when an overtaking yacht has no longer a free choice on which side she will pass, and continues to exist as long as the leeward yacht by luffing, or the weather yacht by bearing away, is in danger of fouling.

#### 7. Altering Course.

When of two yachts one is obliged to keep clear, the other shall not alter her course so as to involve risk of fouling.

# Rightof Way

#### S. Luffing.

A yacht may luff as she pleases in order to prevent another from passing her to windward, provided she begins to luff before an overlap is established.

#### 9. Bearing Away.

A yacht shall not bear away out of her course so as to hinder another in passing to leeward.

#### 10. Rights on New Courses.

A yacht shall not be entitled to her rights on a new course until she has filled away.

#### 11. Converging Close-hauled.

When two yachts, both close-hauled, on the same tack are converging by reason of the leeward yacht holding a better wind, and neither can claim the rights of a yacht being overtaken, then the yacht to the windward shall keep clear.

#### 12. Passing and Rounding Marks.

If an overlap exists between two yachts when both of them, without tacking, are about to pass a mark on the required side, then the outside yacht must give the inside yacht room to pass clear of the mark. A yacht shall not, however, be justified in attempting to establish an overlap, and thus force a passage between another yacht and the mark, after the latter has altered her helm for the purpose of rounding.

#### 13. Obstruction to Sea Room.

When a yacht is approaching a shore, shoal, rock, vessel or other dangerous obstruction and cannot go clear by altering her course without fouling another yacht, then the latter shall, on being hailed by the former, at once give room; and in case one yacht is forced to tack or bear away in order to give room, the other shall also tack or bear away as the case may be, at as nearly the same time as is possible without danger of fouling; but should such obstruction be a designated mark of the course, a yacht shall not force another to tack under the provisions of this rule.

On November 1st, 1895, the cup became the bona fide property of the owners of the "Onward," in accordance with the rules under which it was won.

In a deed of Gift, made November 15, 1895, Messrs. J. R. White, Arthur T. Hagen and Fred S. Todd, owners of the "Onward," donated the cup to the Lake Yacht Racing Association of Lake Ontario, on condition that it shall be a perpetual challenge cup for competition between the sailing vachts which shall be in the 35-foot class and over, enrolled in the clubs of Lake Ontario (including the Bay of Quinte) from time to time forming the part of the L. Y. R. A. The cup shall not be held by the winning yacht, but by a club on Lake Ontario, eligible to hold the same, to which said yacht

belongs, designated by the owner, and such club shall be responsible for its safe keeping. For the first race the Rochester Yacht Club was named as the holder of the cup, and is still held by them. It is earnestly hoped that a race may be arranged this season.

Any one interested may secure copies of the original deed of gift by addressing the corresponding secretary.

#### THE "MADGE" CUP.

This cup was given to the Rochester Yacht Club in 1888, by Wolters Brothers, to be a awarded to the yacht making the best record in the Club's fixtures during that season. It was won by "Madge" and was given by her owners to the Club, to be raced for each year, and awarded to the yacht making the best record in all the Club races and cruises for that year.
