

On Thursday, the Canadian guests also have been invited to the regular luncheon which the women's group is to hold that day.



On Wednesday evening, following dinner, there will be dancing to an orchestra until midnight.



But it will be a gala affair, when the trophies will be awarded and the Canada Cup given to its winner.


For those who do not own boats, two large craft will be available for the public and visitors may see one or all the races and be in at the finish.
