
Fifty women participated in the Women's Nationals held here in July. They came from all over the East and as far as California to compete. Several RYC women placed well in the overall standings: In the Singlehanded event Carolyn Holahan finished 21st; in the Doublehanded event the best RYC finishers among 20 boats were: Nancy Kaiser and Elizabeth Britton, 9th; Helen Ingerson and Jennie Brown, 10th. The top three finishers in each category returned to compete in the Women's Worlds in September.

Ninety women from 17 countries competed in the Worlds, allowing 3 entries per country in both the singlehanded and doublehanded classes and represented the highest level of racing in which women race separately from men. During the 7 days of racing, 6 races were run on Olympic courses, and the winds varied from day to day from under 5 knots to over 30! It was a tremendous week of racing, in which 2 Swedish women fought a







Memorial Day ... the start of a new boating season.





SUMMER CRUISE







1980 SAILING INSTRUCTIONS



1. GENERAL SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

- 1.1 **SCOPE**—These sailing instructions apply to course races sailed on the Olympic Circle or cruising fleet course and normally a part of R.Y.C. recognized series. Supplemental sailing instructions may be required for regattas, distance races, and all other course racing.
- 1.2 **RULES**—Races governed by these sailing instructions are conducted under the International Yacht Racing Union Rules as adopted by U.S.Y.R.U. and specifically set forth in the "1977 Yacht Racing Rules". Class rules shall be treated as part of the sailing instructions.
- 1.3 **ADMINISTRATION**—Each Fleet Captain will maintain a complete fleet roster showing each skipper, yacht, and racing number. The fleet will specify the particular scoring system for his/her fleet. It is the Fleet Captain's responsibility to score each race and post the results.
- 1.4 **PROTESTS**—Protests will be heard at the R.Y.C. Clubhouse at 1700 hours on Sunday during the regular racing season. Special protest meetings may be called by the chairman of the Protest Committee upon reasonable notice to all parties. All protests must be submitted in writing within one hour after the return of the yacht to the basin or its other area mooring. A depository for protests will be located at the Clubhouse liquor service counter. Each protest must contain the date and time it is placed into the depository with such information attested to by the signature of the bartender on duty. Failure to incorporate this information on the form will void the protest. The standard U.S.Y.R.U. protest form (available from fleet captains, protest committee or at the liquor service counter) should be used. Written protests as prescribed in rule 68.3 (d) are also acceptable.
 - 1.4.1 **ALTERNATIVE PENALTIES**—Alternates to disqualification for infringement of a rule as required by the 1977 Yacht Racing Rules on protests are included within these instructions as prescribed by Rule 3.2 (b) XIV.
 - 1.4.1a **720° TURNS**—A yacht of any class which acknowledges infringing a rule of Part IV may exonerate herself by making two full 360° turns (720°).
 - 1.4.1b **SAFETY REQUIREMENTS**—A time or position penalty as uniformily defined by the R.Y.C. Protest Committee shall be assessed any yacht which infringes upon the safety requirements of her fleet.
- 1.5 **CREW**—Regular crew members of boats participating in class races shall be members of the Rochester Yacht Club, Junior Yacht Club, or the immediate family of an R.Y.C. member.
 - 1.6 **RACING PROGRAM**—The racing program consists of:
 - (1) Saturday afternoon racing with three starts for one-design classes.
 - (2) Sunday racing with five cruising fleet division starts and three one-design starts.
 - (3) Wednesday night racing with one-design and cruising fleet starts as required.

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- (4) Additional programs are available for Laser's, 420's, and Ladies Racing Association as specified in separate individual sailing instructions.
- 1.7 **STARTING TIMES**—The starting times contained in Appendix A of the General Sailing Instructions are the scheduled times for the firing of the Starting gun. Warning and Preparatory guns will each be fired at five minute intervals. The committee boat will be on station at the starting buoy five minutes before the first Warning gun.
- 1.8 **STARTING SIGNALS**—All signals shall be in accordance with Rule 4, except those starting signals contained in the Appendix A hereof shall replace those given in Rule 4.4 (a) of the 1977 Yacht Racing Rules.
- 1.9 **GENERAL RECALL**—All signals for a general recall shall be in accordance with rules 4.1 and 4.7 of the 1977 Yacht Racing Rules. The offending fleet shall immediately retire from the race area to await a restart. Such restart shall occur five minutes after the scheduled starting sequence for all divisions or fleets has been completed. For example, if a cruising fleet division is recalled, they will be restarted five minutes after the last scheduled cruising fleet division. If more than one division is recalled, they will be restarted at five minute intervals in the order in which they occurred. If the last scheduled division is the *only* division recalled, then a new warning signal shall be made one minute after the general recall signal has been lowered. The same procedure applies to the one-design fleets.
- 1.10 **POSTING**—Official notices subscribed to by the Sailing Committee chairman or the Race Committee chairman and race results will be posted on the Race Committee bulletin board located in the gas dock area. All official notices affecting races of the day will be posted two hours prior to the first scheduled start of that day. It is the responsibility of each skipper to check the bulletin board prior to leaving the R.Y.C. basin for each day's racing.
- 1.11 **AMENDMENTS**—All changes to the Sailing Instructions shall be in writing subscribed to by the Sailing Committee chairman and posted on the Race Committee bulletin board. An amendment will not be effective until posted a minimum of 24 hours. A copy of any amendment will be mailed to each racing skipper for incorporation with his Sailing Instructions.

2. CRUISING FLEET SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

These instructions apply in addition to the General Sailing Instructions of Section 1.


2.1 COURSES

2.1.1 SPRING AND FALL SUNDAY SERIES AND SPRING TUNE **UP** (**EXCEPT REGATTA RACE**)—The course shall be a closed triangle shown on the cruising fleet course chart. All distances shown are in nautical miles and all headings in degrees magnetic. The starting and finishing area is at mark "O" (the center of the olympic circle). It is a tri-colored mark identified by the letter O. All races on this course start and finish at or near mark O. The starting line is from the white flag on the committee boat to mark O. The finish line is between the blue flag on the committee boat and the nearby red flag mark set daily in the finish area near mark O. The race course will be selected by the race committee and identified by listing the marks to be rounded in the order they are to be taken. Example: D-B-A is a triangular course, buoys to starboard, to the departure buoy D, direct to the west mark B, to the north east mark A, and back to finish near mark O. The committee boat will post the mark rounding sequence at least five minutes before the first warning signal and maintain that course through the entire starting sequence for each fleet. The race committee may only change courses between fleet starts and only as prescribed in Rule 4.3. Skippers are encouraged to monitor VHF Channel 9 for race committee broadcasts of the mark rounding sequence which defines the course to be sailed. The race committee will also endeavor to use channel 9 to broadcast sail numbers of boats over early. In all cases visual signals shall govern. All marks are Coast Guard approved orange and white striped and have a letter corresponding to their position on the chart painted on the buoy. In the event a mark for the day's race course is missing, an attempt will be made to replace it with a large orange inflatable "regatta" mark or another type of mark to which the code flag M is attached. When one of these marks is placed near the normal position of a fixed fleet mark it shall rank as a mark of the course and be rounded by all vachts. Any other mark in the vicinity shall be disregarded.

2.1.2 **SPRING AND FALL WEDNESDAY NIGHT RACES**—The starting and finishing area for the Wednesday night races is near the departure buoy (D buoy). The course shall be an out and back course in which one mark is rounded. The minimum course length shall be 4 nautical miles. The starting line is from the D buoy to the white flag on the Committee boat. The finish line is from the D buoy to the flashing light atop the committee boat. The rounding mark will display a red flag, be lighted if required, and set out a distance and direction signaled by the committee boat. The Committee boat will display a red or green flag indicating the hand of rounding. Example: 4-075 green would signal a 4 nautical mile out and 4 nautical mile

back course with a mark lying 075° magnetic from the Committee boat to be left to starboard.

2.1.3 **REGATTA COURSE**—Selected races during any series may be identified as Regatta races. For a regatta race, no fixed course is used, rather, a course is set for the day's racing using the large inflatable "regatta" marks. The general starting area for this race will be as near Mark O as practical. The diagram below shows the course.



The following rules apply to the regatta course.

- 1. All buoys left to Port
- 2. Starting line at *S*—(Permanent buoy).
- 3. First leg is always to weather.
- 4. A 90° included angle-to-course lines is formed at reaching mark.
- 5. The two reaching legs of the triangle are equal length.
- 6. The finish leg is to weather.

The Committee Boat will signal the length of the weather leg, the magnetic heading to weather mark, and the letter R. No other signals will be given to identify the course.

2.1.4 **SUMMER RACE COURSES** by specific announcement.

2.2 COURSE ALTERATIONS

- 2.2.1 **SHORTENING COURSE**—Races on the R.Y.C. cruising fleet course may be shortened by establishing a finish line as prescribed in Rule 4.5 at any mark of the course prior to the first boat rounding. The signals given in Rule 4.1 shall be used. The Wednesday night course once established shall not be shortened. The regatta course may be shortened by establishing a finish line at the leeward mark or at the weather mark after the first rounding.
- 2.2.2 MOVING THE WEATHER MARK—After all yachts have completed the first leg of a regatta course, the weather mark may be moved to provide a better (more symmetrical) second beat. The new course heading to the relocated weather mark will be announced and the magnetic heading displayed prior to the first yacht rounding the leeward mark.

2.3 **TIME LIMITS**—A race will be official if any yacht finishes within the time limit for that race plus her time allowance for the course being sailed. Time will be counted from the start of P.H.R.F. 1 yachts, for the P.H.R.F. divisions, and from I.O.R. 1, start for the I.O.R. divisions.



2.4 **SCORING**—Scoring will be low point with a yacht's score in a race being equal to her finish position. A yacht which starts and does not finish, or which ranks as a starter in accordance with Rule 50, Ranking as a Starter, but does not start, or which fails to sail the course correctly in accordance with Rule 51, Sailing the Course, or which infringes the rules but retires within a reasonable time, shall score points equal to the number of boats ranking as a starter; i.e., for the finishing place equal to the number of yachts which started or ranked as starters in accordance with Rule 50 in that race.

Except as provided above, a yacht which infringes the rules but does not retire within a reasonable time, or which is disgualified under Rule 72. Disqualification after Protest, or Rule 73, Disqualification without Protest, shall score the points for a last place finish plus 10 percent of the number of yachts ranked as starters in accordance with Rule 50, in that race, fractions being raised to the next higher whole number. A yacht which neither starts, nor ranks as a starter in accordance with Rule 50, shall score points for the finishing place equal to the maximum number of competitors in any previous race of the series. A competitor is an entrant who starts, or ranks as a starter in accordance with Rule 50, in any race for the series. Should there be a tie on total points between two or more yachts, the tie shall be broken using the "Horse Race" Method. If this fails, the tie shall be broken in favor of the yacht or yachts with the most first places, and should any such yachts remain tied, the most second places and so on. Should any tie then be unresolved, the tie shall stand as the final placing of the series. All races will be scored on a divisional basis with at least four boats required in a division for a particular race to qualify for that division.

2.5 **ADMINISTRATION**—It is the responsibility of each skipper to check the official race committee bulletin board for announcements before leaving the basin.

The decision as to whether or not to start a race will be made by the race committee. If a race has been cancelled, the code flag C will be flown from the Club mast as soon as possible.



To be eligible for awards for a series, a yacht must have filed a racing certificate with the fleet captain in a satisfactory manner. Finish positions will not be posted for skippers who have not satisfied this requirement.

Yachts are subject to disqualification for sailing in the starting area when other yachts are maneuvering to start. Maneuvering to start normally means sailing during the period of time from a yacht's warning gun to the starting gun.

APPENDIX B RYC CRUISING FLEET SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Seacocks or valves on all through-hull openings, except integral deck scuppers, shft logs, speedo transducers, etc.; however a means must be provided for closing such openings when necessary.
- 2. Soft wooden plugs, tapered and of various sizes.
- 3. Fixed bow pulpit.
- 4. Taut single life-lines.
- 5. All ballast and other heavy equipment such as batteries, stoves, gas bottles, tanks, and outboard motors must be securely fastened in position.
- 6. Permanently installed toilet, bunks and galley facilities.
- 7. Fire extinguishers as required by law.
- 8. One manual bilge pump capable of being operated with all cockpit seats and all hatches and companionways closed.
- 9. One anchor and cable.
- 10. At least one water-resistant flashlight with spare batteries and bulb.
- 11. First aid kit with manual.
- 12. Foghorn and radar reflector.
- 13. Shutoff valves on all fuel tanks.
- 14. Compass, marine type, properly installed and adjusted.
- 15. Lead line or echo sounder.
- 16. Navigation lights shown as required by law, mounted so that they will not be masked by sails.
- 17. Tools and spare parts, including rigging cutters or hacksaw.
- 18. Heavy weather jib and reefing equipment on mainsail.
- 19. Radio receiver capable of receiving weather bulletin.
- 20. One life jacket for each crew member.
- 21. At least one horseshoe-type life ring equipped with waterproof light and drogue within reach of the helmsman and ready for instant use.
- 22. The following distress signals and launcher:
 - a. Three red aerial flares.
 - b. Three red hand flares.
 - c. Two orange hand smoke flares.
- 23. Heaving line (50 foot minimum length, floating-type line) readily accessible to cockpit.
- 24. USYRU Racing Rule Book.
- 25. Emergency steering equipment.
- 26. High intensity automatic water light for horseshoe-type life ring (for night races only).
- 27. Man overboard pole (height of flag at least 4 feet above water).

All equipment must function properly, be readily accessible, and be of a type, size and capacity suitable and adequate for the intended use and the size of the yacht.

The following equipment required for long-distance races (Presqu'ile and Sodus):

- 1. Taut double life-lines, with stern pulpit.
- 2. One extra manual bilge pump.
- 3. Spare compass, charts, light list and piloting equipment.
- 4. Speedometer or distance measuring equipment.
- 5. Yacht's name on miscellaneous buoyant equipment such as life iackets.
- 6. Whistles attached to life jackets.
- 7. Safety harnesses for each crew member.
- 8. "Life raft" meeting the following requirements:
 - a. Must be capable of supporting the entire crew.
 - b. Must have integral, inflated buoyancy compartments.
 - c. Must be inflated via attached cylinder, or carried inflated on deck, and securely fastened.

NOTE: Yachts may be inspected either before or after any RYC scheduled race and are required to carry the above safety gear when racing.

OWNER'S RESPONSIBILITY

The safety of a yacht and her crew is the sole and inescapable responsibility of the owner, who must do his best to ensure that the yacht is fully found, thoroughly seaworthy and manned by an experienced crew who are physically fit to face bad weather. He must be satisfied as to the soundness of hull, spars, rigging, sails and all gear. He must ensure that all safety equipment is properly maintained and stowed and that the crew know where it is kept and how it is to be used.

Neither the establishment of these special regulations, their use by sponsoring organizations, nor the inspection of a yacht under these regulations in any way limits or reduces the complete and unlimited responsibility of the owner.

It is the sole and exclusive responsibility of each yacht to decide whether or not to start or continue to race.

3. ONE-DESIGN SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

These instructions relate to the Dragon, Soling and J/24 fleets and apply in addition to the General Sailing Instructions of Section 1.

- 3.1 **COURSES** All races will be sailed on the R.Y.C. Olympic Circle which will be set as shown below. The diameter of the circle is two statute miles north, its center at the tri-colored mark (mark 0). All races will start and finish between the committee boat and mark 0. The race committee will display a card designating the type of course to be sailed (W, T, TW, G) and a number designating the first mark of the course. All buoys shall be left to port except on finishing on occasion. Appendix A, hereto, illustrates the Olympic Circle and sailing courses. The course for the first race will be a T (triangle). The course for the second race will be at the option of the race committee, preferably a TW or G.
- 3.2 **SECOND RACES** The starting sequence for the second race will begin as soon after the last boat from the first fleet to finish as is convenient for the race committee. The starting signals for the second race will consist of a two flag system to help distinguish which fleet is in its starting sequence. In addition to the "W" flag for the ten minute warning signal and the "P" flag for the five minute preparatory signal a numeral will be displayed to designate the fleet to be started next. The numeral designations shall be as follows:



FOR EXAMPLE: The display of the code flags (W, 6) would indicate 10 minutes to a J/24 start, (P, 7) would indicate five minutes to a soling start, (P, 8) would indicate five minutes to a dragon start, etc. If the last boat of a particular fleet finishes before the preparatory signal of a fleet in its starting sequence, then that fleet shall start five minutes after the first fleet. The same procedure shall apply for any subsequent fleets. If the last boat finishes after the preparatory signal then they will be started at the discretion of the race committee.

3.3 **TIME LIMITS** — The time limit for all races is three hours. An effort will be made to sail two races on Saturday and two on Sunday. No Saturday race will be started after 1530 hours. No Sunday race will be started after 1330 hours.

3.4 **SOLING SCORING PROCEDURE**

3.4.1 **SERIES STANDINGS**

- 1. There are 6 separate series per year. (Spring/Summer/Fall, Saturday/Sunday)
 - 2. Each series is scheduled for 10 races.
- 3. In series competition, the **boat** is scored, regardless of skipper.
 - 4. Each race is scored as follows:
 - a) N is defined as the number of boats in the fleet +1.
- b) The 1st place boat in a race is given $N+\frac{1}{4}$ points. 2nd place boat in a race is given (N-1) points. 3rd place boat, (N-2) points, etc. The general form for points in a race is (N-pl + 1) where pl = place finished. In addition, 1st place boat gets an extra $\frac{1}{4}$ point.
- 5. A boat's score is accumulated within a series by adding the points for each race.
- 6. In the event that more than 5 races in a series are held, there are throwouts allowed.

7. All races not sailed by a boat in a series accumulate 0 points.

3.4.2 **SOLING SEASON STANDINGS**

- 1. Season standings are based on races in which the skipper/owner sailed the boat.
- 2. To qualify for any of the 3 season categories (Sat./Sun./overall), the skipper must have sailed at least 50% of the races in that category.
 - 3. There are **NO** throw-outs.
- 4. Points are decided by the ratio of points accumulated in each category to total points possible for the number of races counted. Highest ratio wins.

3.5 J/24 FLEET SCORING SYSTEM

3.5.1 SERIES SCORING SYSTEM

1. FOUR SERIES will be held in a season:

Spring Saturday — 14 races per series (7 days, 2 per day)

Spring Sunday — 14 races per series (7 days, 2 per day)

Fall Saturday — 14 races per series (7 days, 2 per day)

Fall Sunday — 14 races per series (7 days, 2 per day)

(No Summer series, to allow for Wednesday Night Fleet "fun" or "crew" races, Sunday cruising class races, out of town regattas and family cruising.)

- 2. Score the RYC resident member boat owner ("skipper"), but up to a 20% substitution of races by non-owner skippers can occur in a series to encourage Fleet interest and growth (Round any fractions upward).
 - 3. The highest number of points win.
- 4. Points are to be earned as follows: (Essentially, one point for starting, finishing and each boat beaten)

1st place: Number of boats*, plus "1", plus "14" bonus point;

2nd place: Number of boats*, only;

3rd place: Number of boats*, minus "1";

4th place: Number of boats*, minus "2";

5th place: Number of boats*, minus "3";

etc.

*(Number of RYC-registered J/24's in the Fleet on the date of the first race in that series or actual number of boats scored in a given race, whichever number is greater.)

- 5. DNF's earn 1 point.
- 6. DSQ's earn ½ point.
- 7. Throw-outs: If 11 races or less are held in a series no throw-outs; 12 races 1 throw-out; 13 races 2 throw-outs; 14 races 3 throw-outs. (This "enables" missing one of 7 weekends in a series plus one "bad" or "breakdown" race without penalty.)
- 8. Any ties in a series are to be broken by ignoring the 1st throw-outs (i.e., least favorable race) then 2nd, etc., until the tie is broken.) Thereafter, the skipper with the greatest number of "firsts" is the winner; Thereafter, the greatest number of "seconds", ETC., until the tie is broken.
- 9. USYRU, J/24 Class and RYC Rules apply, EXCEPT as amended by 3/4 of the Fleet skippers (one vote per boat) or modified by the Fleet Captain(s) on prior notice.
- 10. A resident member of RYC (or spouse or family member under 19 years of age) must be on board any boat in order to be scored and that member will be fully responsible for rules compliance and the boat. Fleet dues must be paid in full prior to any race being scored.
- 11. To be scored, all boats must have a commercial grade of permanent bottom paint on 100% of the hull below the waterline. Dry-sailing of boats is to be highly discouraged and will not be permitted unless absolutely required by limited RYC and local dockage facilities.

- 3.5.2 **OVERALL CHAMPIONSHIP SCORING SYSTEM** Saturday Series, Sunday Series & Season Championships (3)
 - 1. The RYC resident member boat owner ("skipper") (or skippers as one "partnership" entity if a co-owned boat) and not the boat is scored in this one-design system.
 - 2. A percentage basis applies for all three "overalls" (i.e., Saturday, Sunday & Season) (points determine the four individual series championships).
 - 3. 75% or more of the races in a particular series (i.e., Saturday or Sunday) must be raced by the skipper to be eligible for overall series championships (i.e., 21 out of 28 races if 28 races are held in a season for that series). (Round any fractions upward.)
 - 4. 66-2/3% or more of the races for all series (i.e., Fall Saturday and Sunday, and Spring Saturday and Sunday) and not regattas must be raced to be eligible for the season's overall fleet championship (i.e., 38 races out of 56 races if 56 races are held in the season). (Round any fractions upward.)
 - 5. The highest percentage decimal wins the series or the season overall championship.
 - 6. Percentage decimals shall be computed by dividing the numerator by the denominator, as follows:
 - A) Numerator: The total actual number of points accumulated by a skipper in a series (after throw-outs).
 - B) Denominator: The total number of points accumulated had a skipper been first in all races counted in a series (the "number of boats" in this computation shall be the largest number of J/24's in the Fleet at any one time during that season).
 - 7. The season overall championship shall be determined in a like manner, considering points earned and "earnable" for all series (i.e., Saturday and Sunday points computed as a single series).
 - 8. This system is designed around four strong (Spring and Fall, Saturday and Sunday) series of a maximum of 56 races in the season. Seven successive weekends per series would be raced where possible. If racing cannot be held on a scheduled date, that date would be made up on the next successive weekend after the last scheduled race of that series, but in no event shall more than one full additional weekend be utilized for make-ups in a series.
 - 9. Season trophies and flags will be as follows: Season Championship, Saturday Series Overall, Sunday Series Overall, Spring Saturday Series, Spring Sunday Series, Fall Saturday Series, Fall Sunday Series. (The first three places in all of the above will earn flags, as well, provided RYC makes such flags available.)

3.6 DRAGON FLEET SCORING SYSTEM

DNS — Number of yachts in series, determined at series end

DNF — Number of yachts starting race.

DSQ — Number of yachts in series plus one.

- 3.6.1 Substitute skippers. Score for race is average of other starts.
 - 3.6.2 Drop Races.
- 1. Poorest finish is dropped from series scoring after six races are sailed.
- 2. Second poorest finish is dropped if ten races are sailed in the series.
 - 3. Substitute skipper finishes are dropped first.
- 3.6.3 *Ties.* Ties will be broken in favor of yacht with (1) most first place finishes, (2) most second place finishes, etc., (3) higher number of finishes (placed ahead more times), or (4) higher finish in last race.
- 3.6.4 Fleet Champion. Skipper with best average for RYC races he sailed, and which were counted in any series. To be eligible, skipper must have sailed in at least half of the races sailed.


4. LASER FLEET SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

These instructions apply in addition to the General Sailing Instructions of Section 1.

- 4.1 **RULES** The current yacht racing rules of the International Yacht Racing Union as adopted by the United States Yacht Racing Union shall govern. The Rules of Laser shall apply.
- 4.2 **SCORING**—To qualify, a boat must sail in half as many races as the boat that sails in the most races of a series. The winning boat shall be the one with the highest percentage scored at the end of the season or series. The percentage shall be: The number of points scored divided by the number of points a boat could have scored (i.e. the number of boats in the race that she sails in). A boat shall receive one point for starting and one point for each boat she beats.

"Did not Finish" — One Point "Did not Start" — Not Scored "Withdrawn" — One Point "Disqualified" — Minus Two Points

4.3 **COURSES SIGNALS** — The diagram with identifying letters shown indicate types of courses to be sailed. The identifying code flag will be displayed from the committee boat before or with the warning signal.



T — Triangle

W — Windward and Leeward

I — Windward, Leeward and Windward

M — Triangle with start and finish in middle of leg

O — Triangle followed by windward, leeward and windward (Olympic)

G — Triangle followed by windward and leeward (modified Gold Cup) "G" with start and finish in middle of leg.

- 4.4 **ATTENTION SIGNAL** One gun *One Hour* before start.
- 4.5 **STARTING AND FINISHING LINE** The line will be between the white flag on the Committee Boat and the mark. A blue shape will be displayed when the committee boat is on station at the finish line.

4.6 **STARTING SIGNALS** — Warning signal — White shape — hoisted 6 minutes before the start. Preparatory Signal — Blue shape — hoisted 3 minutes before the start.

Starting Signal — Red shape — hoisted.

Each signal will be lowered thirty seconds before the hoisting of the next.

Attention to Starting Signals will be called by firing a gun.

- 4.7 **RECALL** A white shape with red horizontal bank, accompanied by one blast for each yacht recalled. The Committee will endeavor to notify each yacht recalled by hailing, but it is the responsibility of each yacht to make a proper start.
- 4.8 **GENERAL RECALL** Hoisting of First Repeater (yellow triangle on blue background) and firing two guns. Upon lowering of First Repeater, there will be one long horn blast. Preparatory will be made 30 seconds after lowering. 1 minute rule shall be in effect on a General Recall Rule 51.1 (C).
- 4.9 **SHORTENING COURSE** Hoisting of code flag S (white with blue square) and firing two guns. Finish between white flag on Committee Boat and the nearby rounding mark.
- 4.10 MARK MISSING Hoisting of code flag M (white diagonal on blue field) and firing of one gun. Round or pass the object displaying this signal instead of the mark which it replaces.
- 4.11 **POSTPONEMENT** Hoisting of Answering Pennant (AP red and white vertical bars) and firing two guns: postponement will be in five minute intervals and will end at the lowering of the Answering Pennant. One minute before the warning gun and the warning signal. Postponement can be extended indefinitely with the addition of a number pennant under an AP with one number for every 15 minutes, except No. 4 postponement for one hour.
- 4.12 **ABANDONMENT** Abandoned for the day, code flag N (blue and white checks) over code flag X (white with blue cross) and firing three guns.
- 4.13 **PROTESTS** A yacht wishing to protest *must promptly* hail loudly using the word "Protest", and also notify the Race Committee of her intention, while the committee is still on the Finish Line. Upon returning to the Club House, a written protest must be filed with the Race Committee, on forms to be obtained in the Club House. The written protest *must* be filed no later than one hour after the Race Committee returns to the dock. The Race Committee will fire one gun when they return to the dock, if any protests have been entered at the committee boat. Protest meetings will be held as soon as possible after the racing is over for the day. The time and place for holding protest hearings will be announced. Such announcement shall be deemed notification of all parties concerned and the hearings will not be delayed while waiting for the parties concerned to appear.

- 4.14 **REPORT TO RACE COMMITTEE** As soon as the Race Committee is on the starting line, you are to give your name and sail number to them; and if you leave the race course before the day's racing had ended, you must report to the nearest crash boat or race committee your name and number and that you are going in. Failure to do so could mean disqualification for up to the full season at the discretion of the Laser Fleet officers.
- 4.15 **LIFE JACKETS** It is the responsibility of skippers and crews to wear life jackets when conditions warrant whether or not Code Flag "D" (yellow and blue horizontal bars) is displayed, or an orange life jacket in the rigging prior to leaving the dock or prior to the preparatory signal with 2 horns. Skippers and crews shall thereafter wear life jackets throughout the race. Life jackets must be of a type approved by the U.S. Coast Guard or Canadian Department of Transport.
- 4.16 **SIGN IN** When Code Flag Y (red with yellow diagonals) is flying from the port spreader of the Rochester Yacht Club flagpole you must report, immediately upon coming ashore, your sail number and name to the bartender. Failure to do so will be disqualification for the day.
- 4.17 **720° RULE** The 720° turns penalty as provided in Rule 72.4 and Appendix 3 of the yacht racing rules will apply instead of disqualification for infringement of a rule of Part IV. A yacht which gains relief under this instruction shall report to the RC boat (while it is still on the finish line) the leg on which she did her turns and the number of the other yacht involved.
- 4.18 **FOLLOW ME** Hoisting of Code flag L and the firing of three guns means follow the Committee Boat until new signals are given.

5. LADIES RACING ASSOCIATION

These instructions will apply in addition to the General Sailing Instructions of Section 1.


- 5.1 **ENTRY** Member or spouse of member of the Rochester Yacht Club may race.
- 5.2 **NOTICES** Skippers' meetings will be held just prior to leaving the dock for the daytime or evening races. Any changes in these instructions will be given at these meetings.
- 5.3 **SCHEDULE** Boats must be ready to leave the basin with the whalers as follows:

Daytime Races . . . 9:30 A.M.

Evening Races . . . 5:30 P.M.

Up to six races may be held for each event.

- 5.4 **START** The starting line will be between the staff of the committee boat and the nearest buoy.
 - 5.5 **RESERVED FOR FUTURE USE.**
 - 5.6 **RESERVED FOR FUTURE USE.**
- 5.7 **SIGNAL** Signal will be as follows: Warning signal . . . White shape . . . 4 minutes; Preparatory signal . . . Blue shape . . . 2 minutes; Starting signal . . . Red shape . . . Start. When possible, those on the committee boat will provide auditory signals, depending upon resources . . . a gun . . . a whistle . . . and/or . . . a yell, with countdown to start from 20 seconds.
- 5.8 **RECALLS** *Individual recalls* . . . will be hailed (i.e. over early). *General recalls* . . . signal will be two guns.
- 5.9 **COURSE SIGNALS** The diagram with identifying letters shown indicate types of courses to be sailed. The identifying code flag will be displayed from the committee boat or with the warning signal. I ... Windward, leeward and windward. M . . . Triangle with start and finish in middle of leg.
- 5.10 **COURSE CHANGE AFTER START** The course may be altered or shortened after the start providing the race committee draws attention to the change before an altered leg is begun.



- 5.11 **FINISH** The finish line will be between the committee boat and the nearest buoy, (see course). In the event of a shortened course the committee boat will be stationed nearest whichever buoy marks the end of the final leg.
- 5.12 **TIME LIMIT** A race will be abandoned if no boat has finished within 60 minutes. It may be abandoned earlier at the discretion of the race committee. Any boat(s) not finishing within 25 minutes of the first yacht's finish will be scored as "Did not finish" (DNF).
- 5.13 **PROTESTS** A protesting boat must hail the boat being protested, using the word "Protest", and must display a protest flag. In this series, any piece of red material at least 5 inches square, displayed conspicuously on the rigging will satisfy the requirement. Unless the protested boat exonerates herself, the protestor must notify the race committee of her intention to protest as soon as possible after the race.

All protests must be submitted in writing to the race committee within 30 minutes of docking.

5.14 **720° RULE** — The 720° turns penalty as provided in Rule 72.4 and Appendix 3 of the yacht racing rules will apply instead of disqualification, for infringement of a rule of Part IV.

A yacht which gains relief under this instruction shall report to the Committee boat (while it is still on the finish line) the leg on which she did her turns and the number of the other yacht involved.

5.15 **SAFETY** — The safety of each member is the responsibility of the member. LSD's must be worn at all times while racing (a rule). Boats must not leave the vicinity of the whaler without permission from the race committee.

5.16 **SCORING** — Low points wins . . . no averaging.



- 5.16.1 **THROWOUT** there will be one "throw out" race out of every 6 races completed, (i.e. out of 6 to 11 races, the worst 1 race may be thrown out. Out of 12 to 17 races, the worst 2 races may be thrown out).
- 5.16.2 **TIEBREAKER** if necessary for the award of flags and/or any prizes, ties will be broken using the system described in Appendix 5, section 4. Any tie still remaining will be broken in favor of the boat which scored the most recent first place, or if still remaining, the most recent second, etc.



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
